The Wildlife Department is a busy state agency that conserves wildlife, but it relies on partners like you to help through participation in hunting, fishing and other conservation projects.

WHO WE ARE

The Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation is the state agency responsible for managing fish and wildlife. The ODWC issues hunting and fishing licenses and makes sure the public has important information about outdoor recreation. We enforce rules and regulations and have numerous programs that provide for healthy resources and satisfied customers.

The Wildlife Department receives no general state tax appropriations and is supported by hunting and fishing license fees and federal excise taxes on hunting and fishing equipment.

OUR MISSION

To manage Oklahoma's wildlife resources and habitat to provide scientific, educational, aesthetic, economic and recreational benefits for present and future generations of hunters, anglers and others who appreciate wildlife.

Department Organization

The Department is organized into five major divisions: Administration, Fisheries, Information and Education, Law Enforcement and Wildlife.

The Commission

- The Wildlife Conservation Commission is the eight-member governing board of the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation.
- Commissioners serve eight-year terms and are appointed by the Governor and confirmed by the Senate.
- The Wildlife Commission establishes state hunting and fishing regulations, sets policy for the Wildlife Department, and indirectly oversees all state fish and wildlife conservation activities.

THE ODWC IS A CONSTITUTIONAL AGENCY. IT WAS CREATED BASED ON THE USER-PAY, USER-BENEFIT PRINCIPLE WHERE HUNTER AND ANGLER LICENSE FEES FUND THE OPERATION OF THE DEPARTMENT.

- The Commission also governs all Department operations and financial transactions and meet the first Monday of each month to conduct business.



The Wildlife Department is a user pay/user benefit agency, meaning sportsmen fund the sports they love, which leads to more wildlife for everyone to enjoy.

DEPARTMENT FUNDING

The Department remains a non-appropriated, user-pay/user-benefit agency that is funded either directly or indirectly by hunting and fishing license sales. In fiscal year 2011 the Department operated with an estimated \$50.8 million in revenue. Specifically, major revenue sources are: annual license sales, \$17.4 million; federal wildlife and sport fish restoration grant revenue, \$18.5 million – this income is based on a formula that includes certified number of hunting and fishing licenses sold in the state; interest income, \$1.9 million; other wildlife sales, \$4.8 million; agriculture and oil leases, \$2.5 million; miscellaneous income including donations, \$5.8 million.


LIFETIME LICENSE

Trust Account

- When a lifetime license is sold, the money goes in the lifetime license trust fund. The principal cannot be spent but the interest investment income can be used for operations.
- First lifetime combination license was sold in 1969 for \$150.
- \$88 million in the trust fund
- 205,850 lifetime licenses sold since 1969.
- More than 50 percent of all licensed hunters / anglers are lifetime license holders and no longer purchase annual licenses.

(in millions)





AGENCY EXPENDITURES

- Annual expenditures in FY 2011 were approximately \$45,309,354
- Expenditures by area include:
 - \$12.2 million for fisheries (27 percent of total budget);
 - \$12.6 million for wildlife (28 percent of total budget);
 - \$11.1 million for law enforcement (24 percent of total budget);
 - \$4.1 million for Administration (9 percent of total budget);
 - \$2.6 million for Information & Education (6 percent of total budget);
 - \$2.8 for capital expenditures (6 percent of total budget)

OKLAHOMA IS AN OUTDOOR PLAYGROUND

Oklahoma is one of the most ecologically diverse states in the nation, with more than 760 species of wildlife found here, including:

- Over 350 bird species
- Over 100 mammal species
- Over 170 fish species

The "Sooner State" has:

- Over 1 million surface acres of water
- 1,120 square miles of lakes and ponds
- 11,600 miles of shoreline – (more than the Pacific, Atlantic, and Gulf coasts combined)
- 78,500 miles of rivers and streams

DID YOU KNOW?

- The top three reasons people fish are for relaxation, to be close to nature, and to spend time with friends and family.
- One in three Oklahoma citizens hunt or fish and one in three Oklahoma citizens enjoy watching wildlife.
- The 28,142 jobs supported by hunting, fishing and wildlife-viewing in Oklahoma are greater than the state's third largest employer, Tinker Air Force Base, with 23,000 employees.
- The four fish hatcheries run by the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation annually raise and stock about 12 million fish each year.

RECENT ACCOMPLISHMENTS

2008

- The Lake Record Fish Program was established to recognize Oklahoma anglers and fish.
- On Nov. 4, Oklahomans amended the state constitution to give all people the right to hunt, trap, fish and take game and fish.
- More than 3,000 acres are opened to public hunting and fishing in LeFlore County's Cucumber Creek area.

2009

- Over 1,000 students from approximately 160 schools participated in the Archery in the Schools State Shoot.
- Oklahoma opened the first black bear season on October 1st in SE Oklahoma.

2010

- The Department opened the Outdoor Training and Education Center, part of the 700 acre Arcadia Conservation Education Area. The brand-new building has already been used for hunter education and aquatic education classes, wetland learning opportunities, bird watching and field trips for area schools.
- Holiday Antlerless Deer Gun Season expanded to a 10-day season. Oklahoma hunters enjoyed additional opportunities to harvest deer.
- The Department's Paddlefish Research & Processing center collected data on almost 4,000 fish, then provided anglers with professionally cleaned fillets.

2011

- The Wildlife Department launched several research initiatives and partnered with conservation groups to study possible causes of quail population decline in the state.
- The seventh-annual Oklahoma Wildlife Expo hosted record-breaking crowds of 59,000 visitors over the three-day event.
- 8,000 new acres of public land in Love County were acquired by the Department and opened in the fall as Cross Timbers Wildlife Management Area.

DID YOU KNOW?


- The average Oklahoma angler spends 17 days per year fishing.
- The average Oklahoma hunter spends 24 days afield.
- The number of people who hunt in Oklahoma could fill the University of Oklahoma football stadium AND the Oklahoma State University football stadium almost two times, while the number of people who fish in Oklahoma could fill the stadiums four and a half times.
- Opening day of deer season is the state's biggest single-day recreation attraction. It draws more participants than the busiest day of the Oklahoma State Fair or the Tulsa State Fair.



A LEGACY OF CONSERVATION

- The wildlife department was created as a one-man agency in 1909. The first hunting license cost \$1.25 to fund the Department, setting the precedent of a non-appropriated, user-pay / user-benefit agency.
- In 1956, state voters passed a constitutional amendment establishing the Oklahoma Department of Wildlife Conservation as the constitutional agency it is today. The amendment was enacted in 1957, and the first board of commissioners was created to oversee the Department's operation.


THE ROLE DEER HUNTERS PLAY IN THE STATE SIMPLY BY PARTICIPATING IN THE OUTDOORS IS FAR-REACHING. THE TOTAL ECONOMIC EFFECT OF DEER HUNTING ACTIVITY IN OKLAHOMA DURING 2006 WAS ESTIMATED AT NEARLY \$500 MILLION, AND THE TOTAL ECONOMIC EFFECT FROM 2006 HUNTING ACTIVITY IN OKLAHOMA IN GENERAL WAS ESTIMATED TO BE \$843 MILLION.

THE COMMISSION

The Governor appoints the eight-member Oklahoma Wildlife Conservation Commission, which serves as the Department of Wildlife's advisory, administrative and policy-making body. Appointments must be confirmed by the Oklahoma Senate.

The Commission governs all Department operations and financial transactions. It oversees land and equipment purchases, public hunting and fishing areas and developments, and wildlife management areas.

The Commission appoints the Department's Director who is responsible for all other personnel appointments.

John Groendyke, who has served on the Commission since 1976,


is an avid upland bird hunter. Groendyke is chairman of the board of Groendyke Transport, Inc. founded by his father.
