Meetings:

- Staff met with Garver Engineering to go over the 100% plans for the Manning reservoir construction and the bidding process.
- Staff met with Will Sims from OSU to discuss the upcoming trout tagging project set to start in June.
- Met with Senator Bullard and Representative Maynard at the Capitol to discuss opportunities for boating access on Lake Texoma. Assisted Senator Bullard in selecting members for the Texoma boat ramp task force.

- Meeting with TPWD to discuss our joint Lake Texoma sampling and planning efforts.
- Attended the SDAFS STB Technical Committee Meeting with the Executive Committee and the CAT genetics lab to discuss the pending Morone panel.

Activities

- Completed Hybrid Striped Bass fry production this season with a 58% hatch rate producing 5.5 million fry. Fry were feed to reach 11 days old and then transported to other hatcheries for stocking into fingerling production ponds. Nebraska also received 2 million fry and were shipped and received without any problems.
- Harvested and stocked saugeye fingerlings with a return of 61%. Total saugeye stocked into receiving lakes was 421,000 fish.
- Handed out Farm Pond Bass to applicants.
- Harvested and stocked walleye fingerlings with a return of 68%. Total walleye stocked into receiving lakes was 270,000 fish.
- Moved 1.2 million FLMB fry to grow-out ponds and harvested 700,000 FLMB fingerlings to stock in regional lakes.
- Removed fish from the hatchery ponds for disease testing with federal authorities.
- A training was done for hatchery staff on microscope use and plankton ID.
- Finished the SSP for Fuqua, Lawtonka, and Elmer, then processed and analyzed the data. Also helped with the Black Bass electrofishing at Lake Ozzie Cobb. Aged black bass otoliths from the spring SSP sampling. Stocked FLMB in Weleetka, Holdenville, Wetumka, Sportsmans, Sardis, and Broken Bow lakes.
- Began clearing trees for the access project at Gondola Lake in Medicine Park.
- Department lake maintenance on all properties, including mowing, weed eating, and trash pick-up.
- Collected brood stock bluegill, redear, silversides for Jap Beaver Lake.
- Final close out meeting with contractor, OMES, Garver for the Jap Beaver dam structure project.
- Sooner Creel Survey Update: 239 in-person interviews have taken place from Sept 1 to May 31. (32 the month of May), 53 creel days have been completed from Sept 1 May 31. (5 Creels in May), 99 surveys were turned in from QR Codes from Sept 1 May 31. (11 surveys in the month of May).
- Jason Schooley facilitated the preparation and review of a dozen fisheries rule change proposals for 2026.
- The PNNG crew continued the fabrication of a new electrofishing boat for nongame collections. This is actually an old boat that the crew has resourcefully repurposed to serve as an electrofishing boat.
- Staff collected >80 angler surveys in an exploratory paddlefish creel survey at Kaw Dam and various access points on the Arkansas and Salt Fork rivers above Keystone Lake.
- Fisheries crew collected and stocked approximately 18,000 brooder threadfin shad into regional waters and the Skiatook Nursery Pond.
- In May, the fisheries crews around the state actively participated in four Aquatic Education events, two CAST for Kids hospital fishing clinics and several municipal fishing clinics. An educational fishing clinic at Maple Park Pond in Wagoner, where participants learned about fish identification, casting techniques, and water safety

before fishing. Staff also supported the annual interagency Aquatic Education Program at Gentry Creek, which served local school children. Additionally, they contributed to the "Casting Beyond Sight" event at Honor Heights Park in Muskogee, assisting visually impaired students from the Muskogee School of the Blind with fishing activities at the park pond.

- Mowed and prepped Lexington WMA lakes in preparation for Memorial Day weekend.
- Completed the second-ever Oklahoma Habitat Enhancement Partnership, habitat build and install with the City of Enid.
- Continued checking channel catfish spawning boxes for the catfish spawning box and recruitment study.
- Collected Striped Bass in Kaw Lake tailwater for the Arkansas River Striped Bass Natal Origin project.
- Collected Freshwater Drum otoliths for statewide growth assessment project.
- Modeling and writing work continued on catfish tag retention and gear bias estimates (with Oklahoma State University and the University of Vermont), and writing on Bowfishing shoot and release.
- Personnel collected approximately 14,000 adult Threadfin and Gizzard shad from Eucha Lake and supplemented them into Bixhoma Lake to help increase the forage.
- Fish from the Spring and Neosho Rivers for the Eastern Shawnee Tribe and the Peoria Tribe. These fish are for the tribe's annual contaminant testing.
- Staff constructed catfish spawning/habitat structures. These structures will be placed in some small impoundments that lack suitable spawning habitat for channel catfish and will also be utilized in Grand Lake to boost numbers of Flathead catfish for the tagging effort that will be used to look at harvest and spawning site fidelity.
- Staff continued creel survey project on Greenleaf Lake, conducting 55 additional interviews and eight pressure counts over four days in May, for a total of 173 interviews for the survey to date.
- Staff reviewed environmental review requests and then drafted and submitted responses related to projects that could impact fish and wildlife resources across the state.
- Staff updated statewide Fish Attractor Map with new and refurbished habitat structures that have been placed in public waters across the state. Also updated master spreadsheet and submitted to ODWC Web Developer to include on webpage for public download.
- Staff hauled and stocked Rainbow trout from the Norfork National Fish Hatchery 4 times in the Lower Illinois
- Staff worked on poster presentations for the upcoming National AFS meeting.
- Staff used livescope in the Neosho River to facilitate carp removal.
- Staff worked on invasive carp larval light trap protocol and lit review.
- Staff maintained several river and creek areas: Bamberger, Barren Fork, Echota, Stunkard and Lower Illinois Watts.
- Staff processed several aquatic import/export permits and filed grass carp certifications.
- Monitored Texoma flooding conditions, fishing related impacts, and access impacts.
- Airboat exploration upper Red River arm of Texoma to look for spawning alligator gar.
- Assisted with fishing guide review and edits.

- Roadwork and culvert maintenance at BR
- Progress on the Lake Watonga dam continues. During a progress meeting ODWC learned the project is about 85% complete. The concrete intake tower was poured and earthwork on the back side of the dam was completed.
- Staff tagged 500 fish for the Walleye Rodeo and provided technical assistance during the event. Staff also worked the Walleye Rodeo Kid's Derby that had approximately 500 kids register.
- A fish kill on Skeleton Creek was investigated. The City of Enid Water Reclamation Facility discharged water into Skeleton Creek with high levels of ammonia. Consequently, approximately 52,000 fish were impacted. They consisted mostly of minnows and shiners.
- Three creel surveys were completed on Foss. This concludes a year-long survey. Data analysis is ongoing.
- Staff recorded a Reel Talk, Reel Tips podcast discussing walleye fishing in Oklahoma.
- Conducted upkeep and mowing at Higgins Office and ODWC department fishing areas (Nanih Waiya and Ozzie Cobb).
- Removed concrete spillway overhang at Schooler Lake, repaired holes in siphon, and met with local residents to explain the project and ODWC's stance on spillway erosion and lake level.
- Prepared for and began creel survey on Wister Lake.
- Assisted other regions and programs with habitat and ANS projects.
- Met with/ 3rd District wardens to discuss fisheries-related issues in the SE and drafted three new rule change proposals.
- Scouted sampling sites, met with landowners and began summer stream sampling in the Poteau and Red River drainages.
- Prepared for and conducted catfish sampling on the Neosho River. Catch rates for channel catfish were fair.
- Stocked COE Pond in Hugo and coordinated with landowners on Raymond Gary.

C&E DIVISION

- More than 1 million people saw the Facebook post announcing the confirmed mountain lion kitten sighting. Sharing information through social media outlets allows the agency to reach a broader audience and to continue to reinforce our agency biologists as subject matter experts.
- "Outdoor Oklahoma" is celebrating its 50th season on OETA. The program's longevity stands as a testament to the enduring appeal of Oklahoma's rich outdoor heritage. Over the years, the show's core mission has remained: to connect people with the outdoors.




Figure 1: Depiction of the average daily traffic per year and the estimated yearly traffic by Lexington WMA (orange line), Okmulgee WMA (brown line) and Canton WMA (yellow line).

- Three shooting ranges have been collecting daily traffic data through car counters including nearly 50 people per day at Lexington Wildlife Management Area. You can see the annual activity trend for each range in Figure 1.

- Megan Moore organized and ran a very successful Administrative Assistants training along with Human Resources and Accounting to improve internal communications, streamline processes and facilitate collaboration among the Divisions.
- Jacob Tison, Heather Del Moral, and several game wardens hosted a Father's Day fishing clinic for families called Burgers and Bobbers. Event was targeted at Fathers and their families and filled up within 24 hours of being posted on the Go Outdoors calendar. Event was sponsored by the Warden's Association who provided the burgers.
- Colby Cook and Damon Springer completed repairs on the boardwalk at the Arcadia Conservation Education Center. This will give the boardwalk, which is an important feature of the ACEA, many more years of useful life.
- Kelly Boyer and Shawn Gee set up the Outdoor Education training schedule to get teacher's trained in Oklahoma National Archery in the Schools Program, Oklahoma Fishing in the Schools, Explore Bowhunting and Explore Bowfishing.
- Damon Springer set up the fall dates for the Shotgun Training Education Program FFA shoots.

- Pake Wise completed edits including updating photos, adjusting text to incorporate new hunter education standards, and updating agency information for the 2026 Oklahoma Hunter Education Manual.
- Lance, Kelly, and Michael met to discuss updates the 2019 R3 strategic plan. Key categories and contributing members were chosen.
- Several edits were made to the Oklahoma Fishing and Hunting Regulations guidebook. The final proof will be approved mid-July with shipments arriving in mid-August.
- Progress continues on the paving of the three parking lots at the Arcadia Conservation Education Area.
- The Department's annual Gar Week campaign has become a celebrated event among the Department's online followers and beyond. This year, Gar Week is tentatively planned for November. Planning is underway to share and cross-promote content in a campaign to champion gar and other species, dispel myths and encourage respect for native fish species.
- C&E staff assisted with presentations and Amanda Thomas served as a counselor at the Oklahoma Wildlife Youth Camp.
- C&E staff made preparations to host a booth at the upcoming Delta Waterfowl Expo in Oklahoma City.

- On May 19 Lt. Lawson received information on a velvet buck deer being killed near Idabel by a resident of Louisiana. Lt. Lawson's BWC was not working then, so he was able to delegate that investigation to Eric and Chance and with Mark's assistance, they confirmed the information and made an arrest the next day.
- On May 21 Lt. Lawson participated in a new TV podcast with C&E division's Darrin Hill highlighting interesting or high-profile poaching cases called "Warden Stories". Lt. Lawson watched a similar TV show from Virginia in March and sent a link to that show to Darrin and asked if they would be interested in doing a similar show and they liked it so "Warden Stories" was born.
- Our newest district warden Chance Phillips is progressing well in FTO with Eric and now with Mark. He's been exposed to a lot more situations than what he had been as a reserve warden in the wildlife division, and we are certainly proud to have him here as a full-time warden.

- Wardens Zane Arnold and Trey Hale presented a Snake Identification course to twenty-five home schooled children, and fifteen adults at the Durant Public Library.
- All District 4 Wardens completed their annual CLEET Defensive Tactics Refresher course. Wardens received valuable instruction on use of force techniques, and the agencies policies and procedures on the use of force.
- All District 4 Wardens completed a CLEET Firearms Maintenance course. Wardens disassemble, cleaned, and reassemble their issued firearms to ensure correct functionality.
- Wardens Trey Hale and Zane Arnold attended training as investigators for the Wildlife Investigation Taskforce. The training presented by the Oklahoma Bureau of Investigations. The training focused on Search Warrant Techniques and Grand Jury Subpoenas.
- Game Warden Zane Arnold assisted with a search and rescue at the Blue River PFHA. A missing 58- year-old female with a lengthy medical history was tubing in flood waters causing her to become separated from her party at a fork in the river. The female was located in the water, and alive within hours into the search. The victim was exhibiting signs of hyperthermia and was examined by medical personnel on the scene. She was later transported by EMS to the local hospital, where she was treated and released.
- Game Warden Zane Arnold participated in a Swift Water Boat Operation Course on Grand Lake and the Grand River below the Pensacola Dam. This training focused on operating a vessel in swift water rescue operations.
- Game Warden Trae Taylor attended the GRDA Grappling training in Pryor, an Officer Water Survival training in Edmond, where he assisted in training newly hired Game Wardens, and he attended a Rescue Dive School at Tenkiller Lake.

Dist. 5 - Capt. Gary Emmons

- The rains and stormy weather continued on for a lot of May and early June in D5 which hampered quite a lot of fishing activity. All GWs were busy conducting wildlife breeder/ rehabber license facility inspections, pond inspections deer depredation permits.
- Lt.s Young and Strang and GWs France, Campbell, Buley, Murray, Averitt and Hanson took shifts working the Operation Game Thief trailer at the annual Okie Noodling tournament in Pauls Valley talking to a total of 1,134 people!
- GW Murray and PGW Averitt filed charges on a man for shooting a deer in his yard.
- GW Harriet is working a case on a guy shooting a doe on Chandler Lake property who was sighting in his AR-15 illegally.
- GW Harriet also finished a deer and turkey investigation stemming from a domestic call in Meeker that resulted in four 5-411's for antlered deer and one 5-411 for a turkey with restitution as well as failure to check and hunting without a license.
- GW Mesis had 1 unlawful possession of a wild turkey case.
- GWs Campbell and Hanson finished their investigation which started from a tip about a convicted felon unlawfully shooting a Cy Curtis deer with a rifle in Custer County and checking it in as an archery harvest. Their investigation led to two more men being interviewed which resulted in 9 charges for the 2 new suspects and 5 charges for the original suspect who was taken into custody after his initial court appearance. Their investigation found 6 deer were harvested unlawfully.

- GW Harriet and France took the U.S.S. Minnow on its maiden voyage on Meeker Lake and survived. GW Harriet also caught a group running juglines unlawfully.
- GWs Meskimen and France and Lt. Strang worked a fishing clinic in Blanchard and GW Mesis worked a Cops N Bobbers in McLoud and a family fishing clinic at ACEA.
- GW Buley worked the Canton Walley Rodeo and a fishing clinic at Arcadia.

Dist. 6 - Capt. Mark Walker

- D6 wardens conducted 890 compliance checks for the 28 day cycle, issued 18 citations, 7 field licenses, 16 warnings and 25 administrative fines. Fishing activity has been steady when it hasn't been raining. Fishermen are having good success.
- D6 wardens participated in 13 public outreach events and conducted 15 programs for the public.
- D6 wardens participated in all aspects of the annual Canton Lake Walleye Rodeo including tagging fish, participating as judges and drivers in the parade, putting on one of the largest kids fishing derbies in the state, to patrolling Canton Lake during the 4 day event. Wardens involved were Blake Pearson, Jaylen Flynn, Dylan King, Capt. Mark Walker.
- D6 employees participated in Korn Ferry pay study meetings
- D6 employees have been taking lots of calls on "abandoned" young wildlife.
- D6 wardens have been busy with license renewal inspections of rehabilitator, wildlife breeders, and commercial hunt area licenses.
- Warden Clem completed the defensive tactics instructor school. It will be nice to finally have a DT instructor in D6.
- Wardens Pearson and Flynn conducted an investigation into two individuals guiding
 fishing trips on Canton Lake. These individuals possessed guide licenses a few years
 ago but at some point decided to quit buying the license and had been guiding for
 the past 3 years without licenses. Multiple citations and administrative fines were
 issued.
- Warden King and Lt. Howser issued citations to two individuals for hunting without landowner consent.
- Warden King taught 2 days of water survival to one of the new game wardens.
- Warden King and Lt. Howser assisted with a funeral at Lookeba Cemetery.
- Warden King participated in a "touch a truck" and safety day event at Surrey Hills Baptist Church.
- Warden Zimmerman contacted a California resident that was hunting on Grady Co. WMA and was in possession of a resident hunting license. Citations were issued.
- Warden Cornett issued citations to a resident of Alabama who killed a turkey in Oklahoma without any licenses. Warden Cornett coordinated with Alabama wardens to complete this case.
- Warden Stover investigated a case involving a dad and his 13 year old son that shot a turkey from the road and out of season. Citations were issued to the dad who was driving. Warden Stover used the contact as an opportunity to educate the dad and teenage son (the shooter) on the importance of sportsmanship and fair chase as well as how to properly clean a turkey.

Dist. 7 – Capt. Jeff Headrick

- Warden D. Jones working turkey guides known for putting out bait.
- Warden D. Jones assisted worked incident of a fisherman being harassed at Gage beach.
- Warden D. Jones assisted Ellis Co. SO with an uncooperative arrested individual at the jail per the SO's request.
- Warden A. Vaughan finished up Phase 4 of FTO with T. Blackburn.
- Warden A. Vaughan wrote two hunters that he ran across at the gas station in Cheyenne for failure to report harvest.
- Warden C. Carpenter continues to work some illegal deer kills.
- Wardens C. Carpenter, A. Vaughan, and Lt. J. Edwards worked the boat at the Canton Walleye Rodeo checking 79 fishermen, writing two no licenses cases and one no info on jug lines.
- Warden T. Blackburn has been busy with FTO duties for two different GW's.
- Lt. J. Edwards has been working focusing on turkey road hunters and hunters hunting turkeys over bait.
- Warden A. Vaughan worked the Kids Fishing Derby, 600 plus kids participated, the Walleye Rodeo Association gave away 40 Lifetime Fishing Licenses.
- Warden D. Jones assisted with storm spotting when the tornado came into SW Ellis County that passed just on the west side of Arnett.
- Warden J. Brothers has been busy with FTO duties for GW W. Slade
- Warden T. Raasch, B. Lehrman, and Lt. D. Smith has all been inspecting several farm pond applications for fish.
- Warden T. Raasch assisted a stranded motorist at Mt. Park WMA.
- Lt. J. Edwards recovered a stolen semi-trailer on private property near Clinton Lake. He turned all the info over to Washita Co. SO.
- Warden A. Vaughan and Lt. J. Edwards assisted working a horse that had been
 possibly shot in Dewey County. It was determined that the horse had most likely
 been struck by lightning. The exit wound of the lightning strike had the appearance
 of a gunshot wound. This occurred in a high elk activity area where there had been
 several elk illegally shot over the last few years.
- Warden J. Brothers finished up Phase 1 FTO training for GW W. Slade. Several fishing citations were written at Frederick Lake.
- Warden T. Blackburn continued with FTO training for GW W. Slade, part of that training being assisting with a new Commercial Hunt Area drive in Roger Mills Co.
- Wardens C. Carpenter worked with T. Campbell on finalizing all charges on suspects from last fall illegal deer hunting kills and a felon in possession of a firearm charge. The investigation began when one of the suspects took his 160" buck to Rack Madness at HQ, then bragged about his kill on social media.
- Lt. J. Edwards assisted Washita Co. SO with a wanted felon incident in Canute.
- Several GW's worked several Farm Pond Fish Application inspections.

Dist. 8 - Capt. Ben Bickerstaff

• Warden League is continuing to work with Capt Bickerstaff on a long form turkey season investigation on several persons hunting turkeys over bait. The 10 or so individuals involved were caught with a cell phone camera that was placed watching the entrance to a permanent blind within 30 yards of active feeders with the landowner's permission. The experiment ran nearly all season long. It ended with

our camera being stolen and SD card being wiped by the main violator. Most violators have been identified, but we are now waiting for the results of the main violator's own cell phone camera contents requested to be searched in a search warrant to look for additional charges of illegal turkeys that haven't been checked and overlimit cases.

- Several D8 Wardens are working area Public Outreach fishing clinics. Wardens
 Leage, Badley, Reigh, and P. Cottrill worked a youth fishing clinic in conjunction with
 the Refuge at the SPNWR Bonham pond. Wardens Reigh, B. Cottrill, League, Badley,
 Leonard, and Lt. Paul worked an underprivileged youth fishing clinic in Enid at
 Meadow Lake. Several first fish were caught by the newest generation of fishermen
 and even more lines untangled by smiling GWs.
- D8 welcomes the transfer of Warden Gearhart to Texas county as of June 1st. She has some big shoes to fill, but we are sure she will do a fine job. She will also be busy protecting the remaining antelope population in the panhandle.
- Several D8 Wardens traveled to the eastern part of the district during the past Memorial Day weekend to find fishermen and water to fish. Hundreds of contacts were made, and some violations were observed and atoned for.
- Warden Leage is entered into phase 2 of the FTO program, Warden Leonard is entering phase 4, and Warden Ge S arhart has finished phase 5 of the program. All are well on their way to a very productive career in wildlife law enforcement.
- Heavy rains, sometimes of 6" plus, have blown up area lakes on the eastern part of the district and slowed fishing, but it has also allowed for the movement of fish from down streams to enter the district for future fishing success. Always got to look at the bright side of things.
- Warden B. Cottrill investigated a fish kill with the City of Enid as the main culprit dumping sewage into Skeleton creek. Several dead fish were documented for later restitution.
- Warden P. Cottrill attended court for a successful prosecution of an illegal deer from last season. He and Warden Leonard assisted with the Walleye rodeo fishing event at Canton Lake.
- Warden Grace represented the ODWC in the Special Olympics escort from Ponca City. He also assisted with investigating an illegal turkey case and an illegal deer poaching incident recently in Osage county.
- Warden Reigh continues to work with Autry Vo tech in their outdoor related curriculum. He is continuing work with other agencies and grants for his local Medford kids fishing pond project.

Investigations/Training - Capt. Loftis WILDLIFE INVESTIGATIONS SPECIALIST/WILDLIFE INVESTIGATION TEAM (WIT)

- Inv Long and Warden Jackson assisted USFWS Special Agents with a multistate/jurisdictional smuggling case with ties to Oklahoma. This is an ongoing investigation.
- Wardens Clem and Rolling successfully graduated from a highly selective Wildlife Investigation School located in Texas. This nationally competitive program admits only a limited number of exceptionally qualified applicants and provides comprehensive training in wildlife investigation.

• Wardens Jackson and Gillham have been assisting GW Tilley with a complex investigation, which has required the writing and execution of multiple search warrants across two (2) different jurisdictions. This is an ongoing investigation.

FTO Program

- All PGWs are moving into Phase 2, and everything is going well.
- The Career Development Program is continuing to be organized.
- Next year's Game Warden Academy is being reorganized and expanded slightly to include classes that were removed from the FTO program.
